- 3. Starter Motor and Generator Brushes and Bushes are still fairly plentiful as they are generally universal with other 6 cyl. English cars.

And a little tip for all you Series VA owners who have trouble with the lower gear shift rod bush located on the steering column just above the steering box. Fit a new Nylon Bush? Forget it! Parents have the right to the enjoyment of their own home. BANANA LEMON BARS

4	ozs. Butter
1	eup Raw Sugar
	tsp. Lemon Essence
2	Eggs
1.	.3/4 cups Plain Wholemeal Flour
4	teaspoon Salt
2	tsp. Baking Powder

1 D.sp. Coffee Powder (or Subst.)

1 cup Mashed Bananas

1/2 cup finely chopped Almonds (or Walnuts)

1 cup Coconut

Extra & cup finely chopped Almonds to Dec.

Lemon Icing
1½ cups Sifted Icing Sugar
1½ oz. Melted Butter
Grated rind & Juice of Small Lemon

Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add lemon essence and eggs, blend well, sift flour, salt, coffee, baking powder twice. Add flour mixture (including husks from sifter),

alternatively with mashed bananas and Almonds spread into greased slab tin. Bake in moderate oven about 30mins. Cool in tin, Frost in Lemon Icing and sprinkle with chopped toasted coconut and Almonds.

When set, cut into bars.

Lemon Icing: Blend together icing sugar, butter, lemon rind and juice to spreading consistency.




