In recent years number plate collecting has become as popular as stamp collecting within the old car hobby and makes a very interesting sub-hobby to our main interest which of course is old cars.

American plates are considered the most collectable due to their colourful appearance and very descriptive slogan of each state. Some examples:-

IOWA - Garden State. NEW MEXICO - Sunshine State. NEW HAMPSHIRE - Scenic. MAINE - Vacationland.

Sound familiar don't they? All our plates from each state are reflected as are our own plates, which look very much liks U.S. plates and far more attractive than the staid and sombre British type of plate which Victoria has had for so long. The first relectorized plate? Georgia, 1941.

Humber parts are becoming increasingly difficult to come by. I would suggest to all H.C.C.V. members to start stocking up, particularly on "FAST MOVING" lines such as fan belts, radiator hoses, exhaust components, disc-pads etc. etc. A few major parts houses are writing them off due to poor demand, so perhaps if enough of us produce a mini-boom in demand, the likes of Repco, P.B.R. Brooklands may maintain orders of stock and thus keep such vital parts in production.

Perhaps too, members can write down a list of parts from other makes which can be applied to Humbers such as H.D. - H.R. Holden front wheel bearings interchange or XW-XY falcon 6cyl.bottom radiator hoses will double as top hoses for series snipes - just to mention two.

If anyone knows of any other parts from other makes, a compilation of such instances could be made into a very handy reference book which I'm sure would be very beneficial to any members stuck out in the mulga! Just last Saturday I went into Brooklands for a fuel pump kit and the man behind the counter said "HUMBER! Ooh! I don't like your chances." (How many times have you heard that?) He was back within a minute with a kit, which is universal to most mech-fuel

NEWS FROM OUR INTERSTATE MEMBERS

Called on John Browne and Faye in Adelaide a couple of weeks ago and found they'd sold the lovely Daimler that John was so impressed with when he wrote the series that ended in our last Humberette.

The replacement is a Reliant Scimitar - a limited production English Sports Saloon fitted with a Ford V6 motor. Body is all fibreglass and the styling of John's car - a very rare one in Australia - is a notchback with four headlights not unlike the early Celicas.

The body had been reducoed without adequate preparation before John got it and the paintwork was starting to craze and crack so he's now got it all rubbed down and is sealing all the fibres back (apparently they all stand up like the hair on a dog once you start rubbing down fibreglass) and also drilling out and filling the miriad holes that occur in the thickness of a fibreglass panel and only appear if you have to rub it back.

Luckily the original distributors of these cars are based in Adelaide and still have most of the spares needed as well as being able to give the correct advice on handling fibreglass. This of course was only obtained after various so-called experts had given John incorrect advice.

The V6 - same as the Capri V6-sits well back in the chassis, actually behind the front axle line, which results in light steering and excellent handling. bucket seats have generous wrap-around giving good side-support to the driver and passenger while there is an occasional seat more suited for children, behind - a real 2 + 2 car.

The car is quite high-geared, or "long legged" as John puts it, with 4,000 r.p.m. only coming up at around 100mph in top - The car being easily capable of 125mph. Acceleration is quite brisk as all-up weight is just under the ton and electric overdrive operates on third and top giving economical high speed cruising John is still using the car for everyday transport during its restoration as the fibreglass cannot rust or deteriorate even while it is bare. So he tootles around on his business calls with no grille, no bumpers and and no paint!

It should be quite a magnificent car when its finished and provide high performance executive style transport for someone, as John intends to sell it once the restoration is complete.

I've only ever seen one Scimitar before - a fast back style car for sale at Pitstop Motors. The general style of John's car, the cockpit and performance reminded me of a Ghia-bodied Fiat 1800S I once owned, although I think the Fiat had nicer lines. It had twin Weber carbies, a highly tuned 1800cc motor and was also a 125mph machine.

Unfortunately it was pretty much of a rust bucket and after driving it down from Sydney (where I bought it), I finally decided to get rid of it rather than restore it. I'd thought the wife would like it but she was not interested - fancy preferring a Triumph Herald to that!

As far as Humbers go, John has only his two-door Tickford Convertible Mark $\overline{\text{II}}$ left now and with a fully restored rolling chassis to plant the body on, the restoration should not be too difficult. One small problem is that John's in Adelaide and the car's in Melbourne.

Anyway, the good news is that John and Faye got married on June 12th, so lets hope he can now get that Reliant Scimitar finished quickly and then get stuck into the Humber Drophead Convertible.

We'll also have to hope he moves back to Melbourne so we can see it on some of the club outings !

THE HUSBAND'S COMMANDMENTS



The King Pins stored in somebody's garage, may be the set that Mrs. Smith of Charters Towers needs for her 1948 Rover.


With the entry of my son Jim into the business we have shifted into mail or phone orders.

Spare parts delivery is by C.O.D. Post whereby for a \$3.00 postal charge parts will arrive the following day and the receiver pays the postman.


