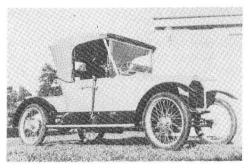

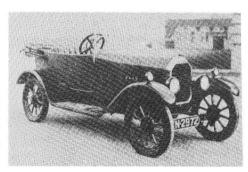

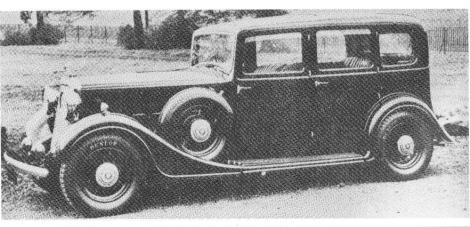
1912 HUMBERETTE 4 cylinder side valve

It is missing front axle, gearbox and prop. shaft and there is no bodywork except front guards. If someone wants it let me know or if I can find room I may get it myself for spares.

KEEP YOUR COOL

Over the years, lots of people have come to me, with overheating problems in their cars, even in winter time. On checking the vehicle out, I often find that it is not the water level that is causing it but other factors, and this is what I'm going to talk about in this newsletter.

One thing I want to make clear now is that I could rave on with all sorts of technical terms, this might please or impress some of the members, but I feel it would be of no use to most of you. I'll deal with the so called water cooled engine that most vehicles use although a lot of points I bring up pertains to the "Air cooled" motors used on some vehicles.

The term "water cooled" is used freely, but it is not 100% correct. Other factors come into the cooling process, it is these that often stop the motor very fast, or to use another saying stops the motor from "keeping its cool".

Flushing the cooling system out now and then helps wash out any build up of dirt and other bodies inside the radiator and the motor. The passageways inside the engine carry the cooling water in and out of the engine, some of these passageways are fairly small and it is this reason why the system is flushed out, also the tubes in the radiators clog up if left for a long time, so I say again flush the system out, about once a year is normally enough. If the system is very dirty you may have to carry out the flushing a few times over a length of time till you have clear water in the radiator.

Another way the motor gets rid of heat is via the oil in the sump. As we all know moving parts cause friction and friction causes heat, the oil takes a lot of the heat with it back to the sump as it is pumped around the engine, once it is in the sump it gets cooled by the air passing past and around the outside of the sump pan. So we must make sure we have enough oil in the motor at all times, not only top it up but change it on a regular basis so that it is rid of any impurities that may block an oil gallery inside, please don't forget the filter also has to be changed.

One of the other reasons for overheating, could be in the electrical system. I could go on and write pages on this matter, but as I said before I don't want to do this.

Two things that can help overheating is the timing on your distributor. If the timing is "out" as it is commonly referred to, by a few degrees it can upset the performance as well, so check or get the timing checked for you.

Spark plugs are another electrical item often overlooked. The motors are set up to run properly with a certain type of spark plug, that plug has a mark or a code number on it to help you select the correct one for your motor, once more if you fit any spark plug that fits you can damage your motor in big ways, or at the least upset the performance, plus cause the water to overheat.

Fan belts slipping or missing should need no mention but it would surprise you how many people overlook the fan belt, the belt on most cars turns the water pump and the fan, both are major items in the cooling process, so please do not forget the belt.

The radiator is where water is cooled by air passing through it, this cool air passing the small tubes that make up the "core" of the radiator is what cools the hot water inside of them. Now if the air cannot pass through because of insects, mud, leaves, etc. etc. the water inside very soon overheats.

Another item in the water ways that can play up is the "thermostat", if it is not opening up when the water heats up in the motor, cool water cannot replace the hot water, and you know what happens then. Some people take the "thermostat" out and throw it away when overheating occurs, this is not the way to fix up overheating, doing this causes other problems.

The next item I'll mention is the outside of your motor, keep it clean as you can, heat comes through the walls of your motor and if it is covered with dirt, oil and anything else that sticks to it, the heat can not be taken away by the air flowing around the motor. Also a clean motor is far better looking, far better to work on and if a leak starts up you can pick where it is coming from, if the motor is covered in filth a leak will run along the dirt and drop off somewhere else.

So now let us look again at some of the items mentioned: flush and clean out engine and radiator, engine oil level, change regularly, engine timing, spark plugs, fan belt, thermostat, motor cleanliness. There are other factors that contribute to a motor overheating but I think if you give the above a thought now and then, it might help you and your motor to KEEP ITS AND YOUR COOL.

The early history of Humber of Coventry is a chequered one. It began with Thomas Humbers fine bicycles which he started to make in 1868' but the name suffered during a spell of four years 1896 - 1900, when it formed part of the shaky empire of the company promoter H.J. Lawson, wherein it made only a handful of low quality vehicles.

Louis Coatalen, later to make his name with Sunbeam became designer in 1901, and Humber Ltd., rose from the wreck of Lawson's dreams to make a new reputation for excellent, low priced, small to medium-sized vehicles of modern, if conventinal design.

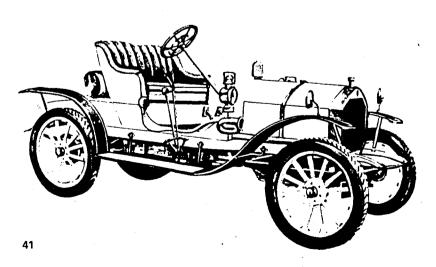
The first to be truly popular was the single-cyclinder shaft-driven Humberette of 1903-05, and until the latter year there was also the Humber Olympic Tandem, a motor tricycle that was also a success. The Humberette, like many of the make from 1903-08 was made in two versions in two factories—The "DE LUXE" Beeston Humbers at a works in the Nottinghamshire town of that name, and the cheaper Coventry Humbers in Warwickshire.

Coatalen's 12 H.P. small four of 1902 was another cheap but good car that had the refinement of a four - speed gear box, although retaining the tubular frame of the Humberette. From 1905-08 almost nothing but fours were made, these including the well liked 16/20 H.P. Beeston Humber and 15 H.P. Coventry Humber, both with steel frames; but in 1908 the company produced the 8 H.P. model which was current until 1910.

This had a 1½-litre two cylinder engine of unusual smoothness for it's type with full-pressure lubrication and the added luxuries of dual ignition and Humber's own detachable wheels. There was a three-speed sliding - pinion gear-box and shaft drive to a live axle.

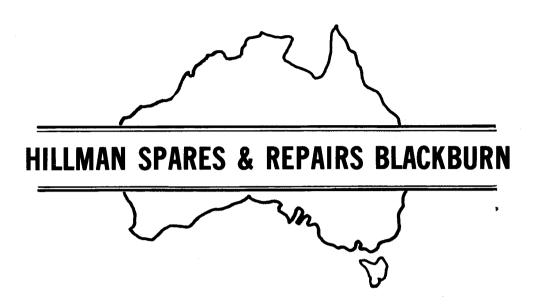
Weight was a modest 14 CWT, and top speed was a very creditable 40 M.P.H.
