Welcome to our Queen's Birthday Weekend Humber Holiday! Yes, it's definitely on. Not at Marysville but on the Bellarine Peninsula just beyond Geelong.

We have accommodation arranged, thanks to the Holmes and Humphreys families, at five residential places all quite close tegether. There's a three-bedroom and a one-bedroom house at Indented Heads. Also the Humphreys have two rooms available at their place which could sleep up to six people while Bill and Joan Holmes have one room and a caravan - probably houseing another five or so. Allowing that children and others could probably sleep in the lounge rooms of the rented houses and that others can bring their own caravans we feel there will be plenty of room for all.



During his mother's visit with the Duke of Edinburgh in the early 1950's a Royal Command Performance was arranged to be staged in the Tivoli Theatre in Sydney and Tommy Trinder was the stage star. Naturally everyone wished they could attend and my wife & I were included in "everyone"

We were fortunate enough to obtain 2 circle seats on the same level as the Royal Party and about 30 feet away from the Royal Box. As can be imagined dress included full length frocks with above elbow white gloves for the ladies a white tie and tails for the men. Instructions were that honours, decorations and medals "will be worn".

I do not know if readers know of the thrill of knowing that we were to be part of the evening. We spent a hectic time in Sydney buying my wife a frock and all that goes with it as well as arranging to hire tails & tie. 

I must say that our Humber Snipe looked the part and we had nothing to be ashamed of, but we had a good laugh about the episode and having to leave the theatre so suddenly.


All in all it was a memorable evening.
