Jack Brabham's Report

Jack Brabham recently tested one of these cars, so we let him take over to tell you more.

"The Snipe has a really beefy engine, but it has been fitted in very neatly so that front vision is not impaired by a high bonnet line. Now it has been given bearings of even bigger capacity, the lubrication system has been modified, there is a quieter fan, and the cooling has been improved."

"What I liked most about it was the excellent torque, which so far as I was concerned, turned the Snipe into virtually a top gear machine. Of course, the overdrive plays a big part in this, and though I've said it many times before, I'll say it again - I like overdrives. It was so restful and pleasant to swoop up to 40 or 50 miles an hour in normal top, flick the overdrive switch and settle back to some really smooth motoring at anything up to close on 100 miles an hour. In normal traffic there weren't many occasions when I felt it necessary to change down to second gear. Believe me, it makes a delightful change after all the porridge stirring you have to do with the gear lever of a racing car round a twisty circuit."

Some Of The Feel

"To give me the utmost comfort 'my' Snipe was also fitted with power-assisted steering. Now I have driven some big cars in the United States with power-steering systems that gave me the willies. The reason is that in their frantic efforts to get a finger-light control the engineers sometimes go too far and take out every bit of feel from the steering wheel."

"I think it is very important to retain some feel of the road, so that you know what the car is reacting to. I was glad to note that the Snipe kept some of the feel, and so it gets my marks on that score. Mind you, I do think that anyone driving a car with power-assisted steering should give a little thought under icy road conditions. As the co-efficient of friction falls there is less read sensation felt through the wheel, and it is easy to turn the tiller more than is necessary.

Summing Up The Super Snipe

"Another feature I liked during my night crive home was the way the heater controls and light switches are illuminated. (Though in fact I prefer a snap switch for the lights instead of a turn knob)."

An additional refinement is the illumination of the heater controls and light switches on the instrumental panal, which has rheostatic control of the instrument lighting and a separate glove box light. There is also a door-operated foof light in the luggage compartment.

The intermediate hold on the Automatic transmission is now operated from the transmission selector lever, thus increasing its efficiency and facilitating its use.
